

Tracey Crawshaw



Tracey has been connected with the Road Victims Trust since 2021 when she became a volunteer counsellor as part of her counselling training.

Now as a qualified counsellor, Tracey works with families of children with disabilities and additional needs and also has her own private practice. She also works as a Governance Professional for schools across Cambridgeshire.

Tracey has a number of hobbies and loves nothing more than spending time at her allotment and a challenging jigsaw puzzle.

Family time is especially important to Tracey and her husband James, alongside Issy, 21 and Ben, 19.

Jacob, their eldest son was 19 when he died in road collision in October 2021. They have a close bond with Jacob's friends and have raised over £14,000 for RVT.

Tracey now supports RVT by sharing the work of the charity whenever she can.



Deputy Lieutenant Mr Daryl Brown MBE, CEO of Magpas



Daryl is the Chief Executive of Magpas Air Ambulance and has held a number of charitable, NHS and local authority board level positions in Cambridgeshire. He was born in Cambridge and studied at Anglia Ruskin University where he was awarded a Degree and Masters.

Daryl previously served as Mayor and Deputy Mayor for the Town of Huntingdon where he lives and was

also an Executive Councillor for Huntingdonshire District Council (HDC) part of the Council's Cabinet and served as alternate HDC member on the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority.

Daryl served for six years on the Governor Board of Cambridge University Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust, including as Lead Governor. Daryl currently holds Trusteeship and Directorship of Air Ambulances UK, the membership body and charity representing the United Kingdom's Air Ambulance Charities. He is also a serving Director of the British Helicopter Association (BHA) and Honorary Commander of the 423rd Force Support Squadron for the US Air Force at RAF Alconbury.

Daryl was the first lay member of the Intercollegiate Board for Pre-Hospital Emergency Medicine and served as voluntary Chairman of NHS Cambridgeshire LINK, representing views on healthcare in Cambridgeshire. He also served on the NHS East of England Major Trauma project board which established the first East of England trauma network.

Daryl was awarded an MBE in 2021 for services to Magpas and the Air Ambulance Sector, and was appointed a Deputy Lieutenant of Cambridgeshire in 2021.



Mr Darryl Preston Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Police and Crime Commissioner



Darryl Preston was re-elected Police and Crime Commissioner for Cambridgeshire and Peterborough on 3rd May 2024 for his second term in office.

Darryl served as both a front-line police officer and a senior detective for 30 years (10 years in the Met and 20 years in Cambridgeshire).

After retiring from the force, he joined the Association of Police and Crime Commissioners as a senior official where he developed strategic positions and lobbied Government on topics such as serious violence, economic crime and sexual offences legislation.

Darryl's knowledge, skills and experience enable him to progress his Police and Crime Plan through holding Cambridgeshire Constabulary to account for their performance. This includes bringing agencies together and listening to the views and concerns of the public and local communities. Darryl chairs Cambridgeshire and Peterborough's Road Safety Partnership and is currently the national Association of Police and Crime Commissioners (APCC) Lead for forensics and biometrics.

Today marks the World Day of Remembrance for all persons killed on the roads across the globe. This leaves behind a trail of devastation and despair, where the lives of families and friends are changed for ever.

The Road Victims Trust (RVT) is a registered charity that offers a range of free support services to residents of Cambridgeshire, Bedfordshire and Hertfordshire, who have been affected by fatal road collisions.

Working in partnership with the Police Forces and Road Safety Teams across those counties, the RVT is able to provide free emotional and practical support

by way of a qualified Counselling Service. The early intervention of our Counsellors provides hope to people who are in shock and severe emotional distress.

However, this support is only made possible by the support and friendship that the RVT receive. As a small, local charity we rely on the generosity of so many people in order to continue to provide our services.

We would like to take this opportunity of thanking you all for coming along today and showing your support for our work.

"Every referral we receive is for us a tragedy unfolding, of lives and families changed forever, but also represents a chance for us to offer our service that will make a difference to those affected".





Become a Counselling Volunteer

It's a challenging role and not everyone can do it. The Road Victims Trust usually recruits new Counselling Volunteers each year and we would like to hear from anyone interested in finding out more.

While rewarding, the role of a Road Victims Trust Counselling Volunteer is emotionally demanding. Our volunteers support people who have either experienced the sudden death of a loved one or the horror of being involved in a fatal or serious road collision. The work also encompasses support during the legal processes that follow in the wake of the collision.

Due to the nature of the emotional and practical support that the Counselling Volunteer undertakes we have in place a stringent recruitment and training process. An initial interview is carried out for us to see if you are suitable for the rigours of the training course and as a prospective volunteer. The interview is also your chance to check out if this work is for you.

Once the training course has been successfully completed, our volunteers are themselves supported by regular individual supervision, volunteer support group meetings and additional on-going training, relevant to the work.

A Counselling Volunteer would be expected to have on average two clients a week. The majority of the work is undertaken as a one-hour home visit and so with travel, report writing, supervision and meetings about 6-8 hours per week is needed to fulfil the role.





The Road Victims Trust is a registered charity offering a range of free support services to residents of Bedfordshire, Cambridgeshire and Hertfordshire, who have been affected by fatal road collisions.

In 2024, 1,602 people tragically lost their lives on UK roads. A road death doesn't just affect individuals, it affects entire communities. Over the past 30 years The Road Victims Trust has made a real and lasting difference by providing *free* emotional and practical support, through professional Coordinators and specialist trained Counselling Volunteers.

The RVT is the first of its kind and remains the only organisation in the country which provides proactive, specialist support which addresses the traumatic nature of bereavement, as well as serious injuries, following collisions. We remain deeply grateful for all of the support and understanding of so many people who have helped to contribute to our on-going success.

All Saints' Church, Huntingdon

All Saints Church on the Market Square in Huntingdon is one of three churches in Huntingdon Parish. It is a late 15th Century building on the site of at least two earlier churches. There are links with Oliver Cromwell, with family buried in the crypt which was closed in 1950, and the 12th Century font from St John's Church in which Oliver Cromwell himself was likely baptised.

The church is at the centre of the community, with our Sunday Services and twice-weekly Chatty Café open to all. We have many regular events for Families, Children and Youth and welcome school and group visits. With its central position in the town and being a flexible space, the church is used as a performance venue for many local groups.

The collection today will be for the Road Victims Trust. This will enable them to continue with their free support to families who have been affected by collisions across Cambridgeshire,

Bedfordshire and Hertfordshire.
